CAIRNS - NUMBER THREE AUSTRALIAN CONFERENCE CITY

According to Rob Giason, the chief executive officer of Tropical North Queensland Tourism, in 2005 this destination attracted over 500 major business events and over 40,000 delegates.

Another important fact is that, according to the Australian Tourism Export Council (ATEC), tourists are staying longer and spending more than they used to. ATEC Managing Director Matthew Hingerty claims that during 2006 international visitors stayed 149.4 million nights in Australia and spent an average \$2665 each while in the country - up 12 percent on the previous year.
