

TOP 5 MOST DESERTED TOURIST DESTINATIONS

Tuvalu

Tuvalu, an island state in the Pacific, is the least visited country in the world. Niue, one of the smallest countries in the world, is located in the South Pacific. Despite its small size, the island attracts around 10,000 visitors every year. Kiribati
